## Message Pastor Dave Nerdig

## NAVIGATING OUR FUTURE

It's cold and windy out there. Grab something warm to drink and make yourself comfortable. I want to talk with you about our future.

I learned about using a map and compass when I was a Boy Scout. The skill proved invaluable on hiking and canoe trips. But when it comes to true navigation, I am less than a novice. The first compass was invented in China as early as 206 BC and was introduced in the Western and Islamic world around 1190 CE. The first know stationary Sextant was created in Iran in 994 CE, but a portable version wasn't implemented for navigation until 1731. True navigators can use Sextant and compass to figure out where they are and where they want to go. In the months ahead, that is exactly what LCOOR intends to do. We will gather together to decide where we are and where we want to go as a congregation. Together we will chart a course into the future.

People who use the Sextant begin by focusing on a fixed point like the sun, the moon, or the North Star. As Christians we get our bearings from the life, teachings and person of Jesus Christ. We begin by asking how has following Christ moved us to the place where we find ourselves today. Then we ask, where is it that Christ is calling us to go in the future.

The questions we ask are not so much about how LCOOR has been serving us thus far or how can LCOOR best serve us in the future. Rather we ask, how has Christ prepared us to serve our community thus far and what does LCOOR need to do to equip us to serve Christ in our community in the years ahead. What particular gifts have we been given as a congregation and how can we use those gifts to serve Christ in Watertown, South Dakota, and in wider world.

These are exciting times. I can't wait to see what God has planned for us!

## MISSION OF THE MONTH: Pine Ridge Reconciliation Center

The ministry at the Pine Ridge Reconciliation Center seeks to foster mutual trust, respect and understanding while addressing the deep poverty that exists on the reservation.

There are four main ministries that operate out of their building.

Threshold/Common Basket Ministries includes everything that is distributed out of the building including new quilts and blankets, diapers and wipes, morning coffee, mid-day sandwiches, hot meals and hygiene kits. In the winter months it also includes energy assistance matching program.

Cultural Immersions are visiting groups who come to learn about Lakota history and culture from the Lakota people. They strive to provide programming and presentations that foster mutual conversations and great understanding of each other. While Immersions are on hold because of COVID, they are updating the center to be ready for guests to return.

Lutheran/Lakota Job Corp employs local people from Pine Ridge to run and assist the ministries of the Reconciliation Center. This ministry provides people with a way to earn a living and support their families.

Children \& Youth Currently, the Pine Ridge Rec-

onciliation Center hosts Kids Time on weekdays after school, offering a safe place to come and play and build relationships with the Kids Time staff. Early in 2019 Pre-Teen Time was also added for 9-12 year olds to come, share a meal and participate in age appropriate activities, field trips, and cultural learning. They recently added a Teen time to continue to walk with the youth into adulthood.

## LCOOR's adopted highway needs some help

Our two miles of road ditch are in need of attention.

It's a simple hour out of your day or evening to make our two miles of Highway 20 look fantastic! Our miles begin on Highway 20 west at 449th Avenue. We have a sign on the northwest corner of that interstection, and our section goes for two miles to the next sign, which is on the southwest corner. (As a point of reference, this is on Highway 20 west past Lake Kampeska, past the water tower, and past the curves.)

We have divided the miles into four sections to make it easy for a family to pick up trash in an hour or less.

■ Section 1: 449th to Memorial Park Road (448th Ave). South side of Highway 20.


- Section 2: 449th—LCOOR sign side to Memorial Park Road (448th) North side of Highway 20.

■ Section 3: 448th (Memorial Park Road) North side of highway West to the LCOOR sign.

■ Section 4: South side of Highway 20 from 448th (Memorial Park

Road) to the LCOOR sign going west.

This is a fun family project, and you can do it when it is convenient for you!

Packets with bags and gloves are available at the Church Office - or call the office and arrangements can be made to deliver the directions and bags. Also ask at the Welcome Desk if you attend services in person. Take the orange bags home with you and dispose of trash in your blue containers.

## Dish to Pass

On a recent slushy, sloppy Wednesday afternoon I ended up with wet feet. Several folks who had innocently asked, "How are you today?" heard about my state of discomfort! Then ... something incredible happened. While I was visiting with someone else at the Welcome Center, she was looking through her purse for her phone. (I hadn't yet mentioned my feet.) And she said, I don't seem to have my phone - but I do have a pair of socks! Ha! Ha! (Yes, I asked. And yes, she gave them to me without hesitation.)

Later that evening, following a Lutherans Outdoors Camp presentation, someone stopped by the Welcome Center to ask how her family could make a donation to our Camp Scholarship fund. I was touched by the offer. The next morn-
 ing, my phone buzzed at 6:50 a.m. A mom was "reaching out" as her kids were excited about the idea of going to camp - but they would need some help financially to make it happen! (I'm happy to report connections were made - and these kids will be going to NeSoDak for the first time!)

If you've never tried Kris Rigdon's "White Texas Sheet Cake," you're missing out! I've had several requests to share the recipe...

## White Texas Sheet Cake

2 c. flour
1 tsp. baking powder
2 c. sugar
1 c. butter
1 tsp. salt
$1 / 2$ c. sour cream
1 tsp. almond extract
1 c. water
2 large eggs, lightly beaten
Butter Frosting (recipe follows)


1 c . chopped pecans
Preheat oven to 350 . Spray a $15 \times 10$-inch jelly roll pan with nonstick baking spray with flour. In a large bowl, combine flour, sugar, baking powder and salt; set aside. In small saucepan, combine butter and water, bring to a boil, stirring occasionally. Add butter mixture to flour mixture, stirring to combine. Stir in sour cream, eggs and almond extract. Pour into prepared pan and bake for 22-25 minutes. Spread warm cake with Butter Frosting. Sprinkle with chopped pecans. Cut into triangles to serve.

## Butter Frosting

| $1 / 2$ c. butter | $1 / 4$ c. whole milk |
| :--- | :--- |
| $1 / 2$ tsp. almond extract | 3 c. confectioners' sugar |

$1 / 2$ tsp. almond extract
3 c. confectioners' sugar
In medium saucepan, combine butter and milk. Bring to a boil over medium heat, stirring occasionally. Remove from heat. Whisk in almond extract. Gradually whisk in confectioners' sugar until smooth.
